

Why Collective Action Matters to Policy Change

Policy Change is HARD


- Need to shift power structures and influence institutions
- Requires time/\$/ resources, skills, relationships & more
- No one person or organization can do this alone!

Collaboration is Key

"It is about working together in solidarity with people you admire and who share your core values [on an issue], and listening to and learning from people who don't always think the same as [you] do... adding your own small contribution to the goals of justice and a better world"

What is a Coalition?

Coalitions are:


- "groups of actors who share beliefs and coordinate their action"
- "groups of organizations that come together to achieve a common policy goal"
- "group of likeminded organizations or individuals who will unite with you to create a shared policy change"

- Who has what resources?
- What can we share? What can we learn from each other?



Example: Medicare Oral Health Efforts






Impact of Collective Action on Medicare Oral Health

Health Measures Land at Top of Voters' List for Social Spending Bill

The share of U.S. voters who said the following measures are among their top five priorities for the Build Back Better plan, with health provisions highlighted:





- 2019- legislation including Medicare dental passes House for first time ever
- 2020- Medicare dental benefit included in a Presidential transition plan for first time ever
- 2021- Medicare dental nearly included in Inflation Reduction Act
- 2021- Biden Administration clarifies Medicare "medically necessary" dental coverage
- 2022-2024- "medically necessary" coverage improved and expanded
- 2024 and beyond... its up to us!
